The Next Strategic Plan

The CREST Strategic Priorities 2024-2029 document was completed and will guide the organisation through the next five years of growth and consolidation. This important document is distilled from the very heart of our school, the CREST Constitution, and sets out the key strategic priorities for the next five years through the four pillars of Instil Faith, Pursue Excellence, Nurture Wellbeing and Serve Community.

An Exciting Future

The Senior Learning Centre project is a significant investment in the future of Hillcrest and Rivercrest, with the aim of providing students with the best pathways to choose from.

Building on the successful growth of Rivercrest over the last 10 years, the Board engaged expert external consultants during 2023 to advise on the next best steps and structures to provide long-term stability as we transition out of our 'growth' phase and into our 'maturation' phase. Key benefits of this revised structure included:

- Streamlining processes and systems,
- Ensuring best-practice teaching and learning approaches,
- Alignment in wellbeing operations and co-curricular opportunities,
- The appointment of key specialists in each role who are equipped and experienced to lead each area in excellence,
- Minimising the need to 'double-up' on expenditures, keeping our school fees as affordable as possible for our families.

To enable these benefits the CREST Leadership Team saw the following changes:

 Deputy Principal Campus Operations – Overseeing teaching and College operations across CREST (including the Early Learning Centres)



- Deputy Principal Staff and Students Overseeing student wellbeing, student services, staff performance and growth, and co-curricular programmes.
- Deputy Principal Teaching and Learning Driving excellence in Teaching and Learning across all of CREST.
- Head of People, Strategy and Culture to best support our staff.
- Head of Senior Secondary Campus Driving excellence in the Senior Learning Centre.
- Head of Early Learning across CREST Ensuring consistent bestpractice for our youngest learners.

The new CREST Organisational Structure is a wonderfully crafted example of a "one school" model that is also able to successfully sustain unique "sub-schools", or in our case Campuses. It enables consistent standards of excellence in operations, teaching and learning, and staff and student wellbeing while allowing for individual differences among our six campuses.

RIVERCREST

THE THEME FOR RIVERCREST IN 2023 WAS 'YEAR OF GRATEFULNESS'.

ivercrest realised its vision, in 2023, to become one of a select few IB World Continuum Schools, with the successful authorisation of the IB Diploma Programme for students in Year 11 and 12. Being an IB World Continuum School means that students can complete three programmes of the IB at the College – the Primary Years programme, Middle Years programme and IB Diploma programme, in addition to the VCE and VCE pathways available for students in the Senior Learning Centre.

The continued growth of the Middle Years campus was a joy to behold, with new facilities being provided to enhance student learning with the official opening of the Rivercrest Centre for the Arts, Sciences and Design, which included a state-of-the-art facility with two double-size Science labs, a Design Technology Hub and Visual Arts studios. In addition, the opening of the Middle Years Gym and three outdoor multipurpose courts improved opportunities for students in co-curricular and sport.

Middle Years students also took to the stage in strength as part of the CREST Secondary Production, Hairspray, with two casts of performers providing opportunities for Rivercrest students to take on lead roles within this wonderful musical extravaganza. Rivercrest Primary's Production, On Safari, was a breathtaking expression of creativity, musicality and performing prowess, with students from Years Two to Four showcasing their skills with confidence.

Learner agency and student voice are at the core of our IB programmes, and this was beautifully expressed through the inaugural Middle Years Personal Project, where students in Year 10 were mentored in pursuing the development of a skill or product related to an area of passion. Some Year 10 students explored the design of hybrid car engines, whereas others learned how to bake wedding cakes and created their own micro-business; one learned the skills of portraiture and painted a beautiful piece representing her father, which was unveiled at the Launch Event – a truly special and memorable occasion.

This experience builds wonderfully upon our annual Primary Years Programme Exhibition, which in

2023 explore how Sustainable practices improve a community's way of life. Year 5 students investigated a range of inquiries and took meaningful action in response to their research. One student chose to investigate how migrant families were unable to access free medical care; following her research, she took action by meeting with a local Government MP and developed an official petition, which led to a proposal to make health care available to non-residents being brought to Parliament!

Our commitment to belonging and community continued to be expressed through the ever-popular Community Picnic, Christmas Picnic, Mothers' and Fathers' Day events, the Learning Celebrations, Exhibitions and Showcase events, and so many more year-level based activities which reflected our shared commitment to connection, inclusion and mutual support. We are grateful to all the families who stepped up as members of our Community Association and Year Level Representative teams to help see these opportunities come to life.

We are grateful to God for our first international trip since COVID, with our inaugural French Language Tour to New Caledonia. Students from Years 9 and 10 spent several weeks being immersed in French language and had the blessing of engaging in an exciting cultural exchange. We are looking forward to the opportunity to expand our international trips programme in the future!

We were grateful for the opportunity to join our Hillcrest campus in the Southern Independent Schools competition towards the conclusion of 2023, and are excited about the high level of competition this will provide for Rivercrest students in the years to come. Rivercrest and Hillcrest competed together in a joint Annual Swimming Tryouts and are planning to send our first CREST Swim Team to compete in the future. The CREST Netball Academy won the Casey Cup Tournament in 2023 and our CREST Basketball Academy participated in the Australian Basketball Championships in the Gold Coast for this first time, and we are delighted to celebrate the success of our CREST Girls Team, who won gold in their competition!

Rivercrest NAPLAN Data

Rivercrest students have again achieved excellent results in NAPLAN again in 2023. It is always great to reflect on the positive impact our teachers have across Years 3 to 9, which come through clearly in the College's data.

Year 3

Our students showed outstanding results especially in the writing domains. 70-95% of the Year 3 cohort achieved either a strong or exceeding level of performance for the tests.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are:

- 1. Grammar and Punctuation: elements of sentence structure and parts of speech.
- 2. Reading: Interpreting a character's feelings in an imaginative text.
- 3. Numeracy: Comparing the masses of items on a balance scale using metric units.
- Spelling: Identifies & correcting errors in single and multisyllabic words.

Year 5

80- 95% of Year 5 students demonstrated a strong or exceeding level of performance across all testing areas, with reading results particularly pleasing.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are:

- Grammar and Punctuation: Identifying a statements and verb usage.
- 2. Reading: Linking visual features with information in an informative text.
- 3. Numeracy: Continuing a growing addition pattern.
- Spelling: Correctly spelling 1-syllable uncommon past tense verbs.

Year 7

90-95% of Year 7 students achieved strong or exceeding results across each area of the NAPLAN testing with a large part of the cohort excelling in Grammar and Punctuation, as well as Spelling.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are:

- 1. Grammar and Punctuation: Identifying sentences with correct pronoun reference.
- 2. Reading: Interpreting the plot of imaginative texts.
- 3. Numeracy: Rounding numbers to a given degree of accuracy.
- 4. Spelling: Correctly spelling 3-syllable words with 's' spelled s, ss, se, ce and c.

Year 9

80-90% of Year 9 students achieved strong or exceeding results across each area of the NAPLAN testing.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are:

- Grammar and Punctuation: Identifying proper nouns used in sentences.
 - Reading: Analysing the effect of language choices in a persuasive text.
- 3. Numeracy: Calculating the circumference of a circle.
- 4. Spelling: Identifying & correcting errors in multisyllabic words with correct base word elements.

VEX has continued to grow in popularity and we now have STEM captains to guide our large numbers of students involved.

Following a relatively slow take up post COVID, we now have a very active and large number of students involved in HPV (Human Powered Vehicles). We are grateful to the many families

who support their children in this co-curricular activity, and acknowledge Mr Bruce Wallace for his ongoing role in coordinating this activity, which has had an incredibly successful year for our students.


Our revised format for the Presentation Ball continued to be a success for all involved. Watching how quickly the Year 11s took to their dance lessons after school was a delight, and an enjoyable night was had by all who attended this special Ball. Every student involved is to be congratulated as is Mrs Kelly Lock and Ms Germaine Moser for their leadership of this event. Our Community Association generously supported our College with an outdoor movie night, Mother's Day and Father's Day stalls and breakfasts, and of course the pancakes after the GAT and ice creams after the Year 12 English exams. Special thanks to Mrs Melani Van der Westhuizen, our Community Development Officer, for the work she does in this area.

We were delighted to engage once again in international tours to support language learners at the College, with our first post-COVID experience involving several students travelling to Japan to visit our sister school in Tokyo. This wonderful experience provided students with the opportunity to be immersed in language and culture, and it is a joy to see our international school partnership continue to grow. We look forward to our planned European study tour, with a visit to our German-speaking sister school in Stuttgart, to take place early in 2024.

Hillcrest students continued to experience great success in sport this year, with eighty students participating in the SIS Cross Country Divisional Competition. We were thrilled to win the Division B Pennant, with outstanding success in U/13, U/14 Open Girls and U/17 Boys and the Senior Shield. In addition, Hillcrest also won eight pennants in SIS Netball, Cricket, Soccer, Volleyball and Handball this year. To top it off, our CREST Basketball Academy participated in the Australian Basketball Championships in the Gold Coast for this first time, and we are delighted to celebrate the

Hillcrest NAPLAN Data

Hillcrest students have again achieved excellent results in Reading, Writing and Numeracy. These students significantly outperforming the State and statistically similar schools across many of the testing areas.

Year 3 Summary

Our students showed outstanding results across the literacy domains in particular. Over 80% of the Year 3 cohort achieved either a strong or exceeding level of performance for this test.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are:

- Grammar and Punctuation: identifying verbs and adverbs in compound sentences.
- 2. Reading: identifying the aim of persuasive text.
- 3. Numeracy: questions to gather survey information
- 4. Spelling: Identifies & corrects errors in 2-syllable words with '-el'

Year 5 Summary

80- 90% of Year 5 students demonstrated a strong or exceeding level of performance across literacy testing, with writing results particularly pleasing.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are:

- Grammar and Punctuation: use of quotation marks for speech.
- Reading: Linking visual features with information in an informative text.
- 3. Numeracy: Identifying the number sentence needed to solve a division problem.

 Spelling: Correctly spelling 3-syllable words with a medial schwa.

Year 7 Summary

75-90% of Year 7 students achieved strong or exceeding results across each area of the NAPLAN testing with a large part of the cohort excelling in Grammar and Punctuation.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are

- 1. Grammar and Punctuation: Identifying a sentence with correct pronoun reference.
- 2. Reading: Interpreting the meaning of vocabulary in an informative text
- Numeracy: Interpreting a number pattern to identify a missing element.
- 4. Spelling: Correctly spelling 2-syllable words with 'j' spelled 'di'.

Year 9 Summary

75-90% of Year 9 students achieved strong or exceeding results across each area of the NAPLAN testing.

The main areas for improvement for this cohort are

- 1. Grammar and Punctuation: Identifies the subject or modality of sentences
- Reading: Interpreting the meaning of phrases in informative texts.
- 3. Numeracy: Investigating the effect of an outlier on the mean of grouped data.
- Spelling: Identifying and correcting errors in multisyllabic words with correct base word elements.



VCE RESULTS & TERTIARY PLACEMENTS

he results of our senior students continue to be consistent every year. Ninety-six students completed Year 12, with twelve students registered as Certificate Only and thirteen students completed the VCE VM. The VCE completion rate was 100%.

Dux & Proxime Accessit

The top ATAR for 2023 was 99.2. The top three students achieved ATAR scores of 99.2, 98.2 and 93.7. Our VCE Dux for 2023 was Sanumi Pallimulla, who achieved an ATAR of 99.2. Our VCE VM Dux was Douglas Fishley. Joel Tan was our VCE Proxime Accessit with an ATAR of 98.2.

There were 71 students who achieved an ATAR. This is less than last year due to more students going unscored and having a smaller overall Year 12 cohort compared to last year. Thirteen students registered as Certificate only. There were 14 study scores of 40 and over (3.7%). This was slightly higher than in 2022.

The highest study scores obtained were:

- 50: Health & Human Development
- 48: Business Management
- 46: Business Management, General Mathematics (2)
- 43: Chemistry
- 42: English
- 41: Chemistry, Psychology, VCD, Economics
- 40: Health and Human Development, General Mathematics, and English Language.

There was a significant increase in students who attained an ATAR over 80 compared to 2022.

VCE Vocational Major

2023 was the 1st year that the college offered the VCE Vocational Major certificate, and the fourth year since the initial VCAL program began. There were 13 students who commenced this certificate with 12 successfully completing their VCE VM Certificate.

Students who have graduated from this program have gone on to pursue apprenticeships, traineeships, and further training in fields such as Carpentry, Electrical, I.T, Individual Support, Hairdressing, and the Defence Force.

Tertiary Offers

VTAC Outcomes

Of the 2023 Year 12 Hillcrest cohort, 74 students submitted preferences to VTAC. All 74 were offered a place in the 1st round. 49 students (66%) received an offer for their 1st preference in the first round, 6 received their 2nd preference in the first round, 7 received their 3rd preference in the 1st round. 1 student received their 1st preference offer in the 2nd round, and 2 further students received their 1st preference offer in the 3rd round.



ATTENDANCE FIGURES

ttendance rates have traditionally been strong and above the national average. The CREST Colleges use the Synergetic Student Management System for attendance monitoring. Attendance is formally collected twice a day (am/pm) and, there is an expectation that teachers keep a record of attendance, in each of their classes. Absence lists are generated and sent to all appropriate staff.

The parent or guardian of any student who is absent without appropriate reason or notice, are contacted by the College on that day. If attendance is becoming problematic, interventions are in place to ensure parents are informed of the situation, and that appropriate supports are enacted to minimise further non-attendance.

he After School Riding Program continued to thrive in 2023, with 80 students enrolled, 25 of those non-CREST students. The school Holiday program was also extremely popular attracting students both internally and externally. Our Wednesday morning class, offered to Grayling Primary School, was yet another community link.

Our VET program enrolment numbers increased from 2022, with 77 students from 36 home schools across Victoria. We welcomed Nicole O'Shannessy to the role of 2nd year VET trainer for our Face-to-face students, joining with Gael Sampson (1st Year), Deborah Webb (2nd Year Flexible online) and Emmi Hoefchen (Glenburn campus). We sadly fare welled Gael after many years in various roles. Her contribution to the operating procedures and various programs over the years were instrumental in developing the quality programs offered today.

This year saw the 5-year re-registration audit of the Registered Training Organisation with the VRQA and we are pleased to have successfully met all regulatory requirements to continue to offer the VETiS Equine course.

Our annual Interschool Dressage competition was held in September, and was well attended despite the appalling weather. 30 schools were represented including 4 Hillcrest students who did exceptionally well in the conditions.

Weekend unofficial dressage days were held in September and October and proved popular with the equine community. Staff and students took the opportunity to compete and all did well.

Jill Strafford joined the team of After School/School Holiday coaches, along with Ethan Height and our regular staff, to ensure quality coaching in these programs. I am also thankful that our daily staff consisting of Adele Couty, Deb Whitworth, Sara Williams and Sarah McCluskey supported by Robin Lang, continued to deliver quality and engaging programs for our students. Sarah finished her time with us at the end of the year and we are so thankful for all she contributed to the centre in her 3 years.

FINANCE & **DEVELOPMENT**

CREST Education is a not-for-profit organisation, and we adhere to contemporary commercial business and governance practices to ensure that finances are managed in an effective and efficient manner. All end-of-year surpluses are applied to facility development and/or repayment of borrowings. CREST has also been successful in maintaining school fees at an affordable level that are amongst the best value in this area. The major sources of income and expenditure for 2023 were:



023 was another year where CREST Education invested significantly in its facilities and infrastructure to meet the growing needs of our dynamic school communities. Over the next few years, the development of the Senior Learning precinct will be the main focus of our Capex spend, so 2023 saw the completion of a Gym and Outdoor courts for the Rivercrest Middle Years Campus, whilst the Board also committed funds at Hillcrest to classroom upgrades and completing an upgrade to the Primary play area. The lingering effects of the COVID period has seen sustained cost pressures on projects with work done to mitigate negative effects.

Rivercrest Developments

At the Middle Years Campus, we completed construction on the Gym conversion project providing a much needed indoor sports learning space. The completion of an artificial grass outdoor playing fields has delivered capacity to play either basketball, netball, tennis and soccer on each of the three courts with a beach volleyball court added alongside.

Hillcrest Developments

Significant landscape works to upgrade the Primary playground were completed to deliver an enhanced outdoor play and learning area. Renovations were also completed on 2 secondary classrooms and these upgrades significantly improved their amenity and suitability.

Masterplanning

The commencement of planning for the Crest Senior Learning precinct, has brought more focus on the masterplan for the balance of the site, and the Board continues to strategically explore a range of opportunities.

TEACHER QUALIFICATIONS

The Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT) monitors the registration of teachers throughout Victoria, ensuring all teachers meet the standards of professional teaching practice within three domains of knowledge, practice and engagement.

Besides the formal tertiary qualifications that are necessary for a teacher to gain registration through the VIT, teachers are encouraged to work towards a high level of continual professional learning.

In keeping with VIT principles and the delivery of learning experiences to our young people, our staff hold qualifications that range from Diploma level to Doctorate.
